Dear FCC Family and Friends,

Frank Oliver told me a joke last week. It is about a pastor with a congregant who was a farmer. The farmer hadn't been in worship for quite some time and hadn't been giving to the church. The pastor knew the farmer was very successful and had a beautiful farm; so, he decided to go out and see him.



When the pastor got to the farm, he saw the farmer getting ready to get on his tractor; so, the pastor went over and asked if he could ride with him for a while. The farmer said, "Sure." The pastor climbed up and sat next to him on the big tractor. The farmer began plowing up his fertile land and after being silent for a while, the pastor said, "The Lord sure has blessed you with this fine farm." The farmer said, "He sure has." After another couple of passes around the field, the pastor again said, "Yes, the Good Lord has certainly blessed you." The farmer said, "He sure has."

This continued a few more times as the farmer just kept plowing in silence. The pastor then said again, "The Lord sure has blessed you with the wonderful and productive farm." To which the farmer replied, "Yes, He sure has. But, you should have seen it before I got it."

I believe in our world today is a real lack of gratitude for the gifts we receive from God. For the farmer, God gave the gifts for knowing how to turn fallow land into fruitful land. God sent the rains and the sunshine. God even gave the seed the farmer planted and the miracle of life that is in the seed that bursts forth and grows. Yet, the farmer takes credit for using his own gifts to create a productive farm. While he might say the Lord has blessed him, in truth, the farmer believes that he is the one who deserves the credit.

There just seems to be something about human nature that causes many to believe that whatever earthly success comes their way, they earned everything they have received and God had nothing to do with it; it is because they were smarter, more talented, and more gifted. Yet those on the other end of the spectrum often praise or blame God for their condition—whatever it may be.

I believe this is because we seem to live in a world which worships financial success and wealth, and we forget that we are all God's creation and that any success we have is because of the gifts He has provided to us. There are some who seem to believe that God owes them success. They profess to be followers of Christ, attend worship, pray for God's blessings, and feel they are owed answers to all their prayers. As such, they rarely recognize the real blessings that He offers.

Our text from John's Gospel for Sunday follows Jesus' feeding of the 5,000 with the five barley loaves and two fish provided by a young boy. A miraculous sign: free bread!

Free food certainly has an appeal. Remember the people who camped out around the new Chick-fil-A before it opened? The prize was to be free Chick-fil-A sandwiches for a year. As a former newspaper reporter, I can tell you there is some truth to the belief that the best way to get good press coverage of an event is to have free food for the press.

I can't tell you the times I've heard people say that we should have a fellowship lunch every Sunday because attendance seems to be better when a meal is involved. Of course, when we celebrate the Lord's Supper each week we have the greatest meal possible.

Jesus fed the crowd and they had had their fill and they were ready to make Him king. Jesus tried to get away with his disciples, but the desire for more free food caused the crowd to find Him. They wanted more. They forgot about the giver and focused on the gifts. With their mouths they called Jesus "Rabbi," but with their hearts they proved they were unwilling to listen and learn. They came looking for more miracles. They came looking to make Jesus a bread king—someone who would always make sure they had enough food to eat.

I wonder how many people around the world will be in church Sunday looking for Jesus the bread king, rather than a Savior King?

If you are looking for physical treasurers, you are in the wrong place. If you are looking for Spiritual treasures you will find them in abundance. It is the Spiritual treasures that Jesus promises that will bring the true joy in your life. It is when we have the Spiritual treasures that we understand that all we have in life are gifts from God that belong to Him.

Numerous studies have shown that people who have been blessed with wealth are the happiest when they begin giving their time, talents, and money to ministries and programs that help improve the lives of others. As an old Jaycee, I'm always reminded of one particular line from the Jaycee Creed—"Service to humanity is the best work of life." When people try it, they find out how true it is.

The sermon title for Sunday is "Hungry" and is based on John 6:24-35. I pray that you will come hungry, not for the refreshments that will be served at the reception for a newly retired Pastor Janet, but hungry for a filling of the Bread of Life. If you are able, be in worship and join us in honoring Pastor Janet and our Savior King.
