Dear FCC Family and Friends,

It has become a joke. "I read it on-line; so, it must be true." Unfortunately, it's not a joke when people do real research and discover that time-after-time what they read on-line is often gossip, half-truth, and just flat wrong. I'm sure I'm not the only one who has gotten one of those e-mails, or Facebook posts, that seems to cause your blood pressure to spike. I don't use Twitter, and based on some of the things I've seen on television and in the paper, I'm glad I don't. Some people can spew a lot of hate in 140 characters or less. Unfortunately, unless we want to block some of our friends through our e-mail filter or on Facebook, we never know what we are going to be reading once we open the e-mail or look at the post.

I particularly don't like the e-mails that encourage you to forward the message because if you do that, somehow you'll get a special blessing from God; or if you don't, you are doomed to have a bad day. I don't think God works that way.

I've seen some pretty significant arguments break out over a Facebook post, particularly if it is a political item, or presents a view to which someone has a radically different view. Someone started a Facebook group for my high school class, and one day I discovered that a classmate had been "kicked off" because he expressed views in support of a hot-button issue.

What brought this to my mind this week is that I read three articles from Ministry Matters that focus on this same area. Tyler Saldana, in an article titled "Loving Your Social Media Neighbor," says that we've all had opportunities to comment on "a controversial photo, a seemingly racist/hateful status update, ....or an extremist 'article' for propaganda-like video that clearly lacked credibility." He says, "You ask yourself, 'Do I comment and start another Facebook Feud (Twitter Tango or Instagram Instafight) or do I technologically bite my lip and move on?"

He reminds us that lesus says we are to love our neighbor. Then lesus is asked by the religious leader, "But who really is my neighbor?" Jesus, then tells the story that we've come to know as the Parable of the Good Samaritan. Saldana says we need to love the Tweeter next door. He asks the question, "How would He (Jesus) say the great commandments, loving God and loving our neighbors, should affect the way we engage with people on social media?

Joseph Yoo, in an article titled "The Power of Words" says the old adage that sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me, should be changed to say, "Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will have such a lasting effect that I may have to go see a counselor for the rest of my life, so thanks for that."

He says, "Not only do words hurt, that hurt stays with you for a long time. Bones mend. Cuts heal. The words cut at the heart, mind, and soul."

We've all heard the stories about how words about someone on Facebook or Twitter hurt them so deeply that they committed suicide. Words hurt, when they are said to our face, but they hurt more when they are said on Facebook and others pile on. Some insult once hurled in private has been replaced by one seen by anyone, including loved ones. Cyberbullying is one of today's greatest tragedies.

Ron Edmondson, in his article "There's a Modern-Day Bullhorn in Town" relates that he remembers the days when he saw someone on a sidewalk with a bullhorn in their hand, shouting at crowds, 'Repent or Perish.'" He says, "They meant well. They had a passion for their work—they wanted people to come to realize the amazing gospel of grace. I get that. And, I applaud the desire...But I never thought it was an effective method of evangelism."

He says, "It doesn't seem to me a bullhorn on the street—or a sign saying 'God hates\_\_\_\_\_'—is the best way to share a message of love. And isn't that the message? 'For God so loved the world...."

"Well, there's a new bullhorn in town," he says. "It's loud and it's on every street corner, figuratively speaking. It's called social media."

He says, "It's where the bullhorn holder posts or shares a condemning statement towards someone with whom they don't agree—sinners we call them. They make a proclamation against them. They complain. They bash. They condemn. They attempt to frighten. They are loud."

The bullhorn approach comes across as having little grace, he says.

As Christians, we must be careful what we say and what we do. It is bad enough to say something in private that causes hurt, but when you put it on-line, on Facebook, or Twitter, it can get shared with thousands. When you hit "send" or "post," the things you say cannot be recalled or taken back.

This coming Sunday is Josh's Sunday to preach. His sermon is titled "Jesus" and is based on Mark 8:27-30.

This Sunday is Round-Up Sunday. If you are able, come and share some real "face time" with your church family. Don't tweet—talk. Be kind to one another. The all-church pot luck breakfast is another chance to develop a deeper friendship with your church family.
