Dear FCC Family and Friends,

Have you ever noticed how some words today have different meaning than they did just a few years ago? Part of it is technology. However, it just seems to be a natural thing that happens. It has been said "Language is metamorphic—it changes and adapts over time."

For Christians, we only need to pick up a King James Version of the Bible, and we will find words that are foreign to our ears. Perhaps that is why someone complied the "New King James Version." I've always liked the Andy Rooney style routine that Dr. Joe Bessler, of Phillips Seminary, sometimes does on the Bible. For example, in Andy Rooney style, he would ask, "Was there a new King James that requested a new translation?" He makes fun of all the "new" references to various translations as if something new had happened to change God's Word.

One person writing on this week's Lectionary text writes, "Apocalyptic understanding, although common, is misunderstood mostly because people move to the sister word: 'apocalypse', and it immediately invokes strong ideas."

He writes that "For many it might be a vague knowledge that the last book in the New Testament—Revelations—is Apocalyptic literature." He goes on to say that many people would interpret that it speaks of the "apocalypse" as the end of times.

All-in-all Revelations is a confusing book. Noted pastor and author Max Lucado says, "If anyone tells you they understand Revelations, you better get away from them." People who claim to know what Revelations means are always making dire predictions about the end of time and the rapture.

Just a couple of months ago, there were predictions that the end was coming when a total eclipse of the moon occurred during a blood moon. On television, there were stories about people stocking up at the survival stores in Utah.

A few years before, some people believed the world would come to an end on December 12, 2012 because the Mayan long-count calendar ended on that date.

Of course, who can forget 2011 when Rev. Harold Camping, American Christian radio host told the world that the Rapture/Judgment Day would take place on May 21, 2011; and when it didn't happen, he said that adjustments to the math needed to be made. Then he predicted the end of the world would take place five months later on October 21, 2011. If it happened, I guess we all missed it.

Each time there is a millennial year around the corner, there are similar predictions. It happened as the world approached 1000, and most of you remember Y2K when the year 2000 rolled around.

When Jesus predicted the Temple, with all its mighty and beautiful stones would fall with no stone left upon another, his disciples wanted a sign. *Tell us, when will this be, and what will be the sign that all these things are about to be accomplished.* Mark 13:4 NRSV.

Jesus warns them and us not to let people lead us astray. I guess that would include Rev. Camping or anyone else who seems to think he/she has an inside track on when Christ is returning. Jesus then says to His disciples, When you hear of wars and rumors of wars, do not be alarmed; this must take place, but the end is still to come. For nation will rise against nation, and kingdom against kingdom; there will be earthquakes in various places; there will be famines. This is but the beginning of birth pangs. Mark 13:7-8 NRSV.

Not exactly signs, are they? Has there ever been a time when there haven't been wars and rumors of wars in our world? How many places are we experiencing these today? Has there been a time when kingdoms and nations have not been at odds? Earthquakes are happening here in Oklahoma on an almost daily basis, and they've been occurring throughout the world on a regular basis since Jesus said those words. People have also been starving somewhere in the world since before Jesus said those words, and for some 2,000 years after.

What seems to be missed is that Jesus calls these "birth pangs." Apocalyptic literature is not meant to provide a blueprint, but to wake us up to be always ready. Think about those rumble strips on the side of the highway. They are designed to wake us up when we are drifting off the road, so we can correct our path before disaster strikes. Apocalyptic literature should do the same for us when we are drifting toward disaster in our spiritual life.

There is one thing that we do know, and that is, at sometime—time will end. It may end for us at death, or it may end with the Rapture. Regardless, we need to be prepared and ready.

The sermon title for Sunday is "Countdown" and is based on Mark 13:1-8.

If you are able, be in worship with your church family this Sunday and every Sunday you are able. It is one way we get off the rumble strips and back where we need to be spiritually.
