# THE SHAWNEE CHRISTIAN

#### Dear FCC Family and Friends,

Somehow the word "holiday" has become an oxymoron. The word "holiday" comes from old English words that meant "holy day." Yet, in our time it seems to have lost its meaning. We have more holidays that have nothing to do with holy days, than those that do. Also, in Europe, the word "holiday" is used synonymously with the word "vacation." For most people a vacation is a time for getting away from the stress of working 40-50 hour weeks. Vacation is supposed to be a time for relaxing, slowing down, having fun.

Yet the holiday season between Thanksgiving and Christmas can be a season of stress. This year it seemed people and stores started the countdown toward Christmas clear back in September. Or, was the focus on the countdown to "Black Friday?" Rather than a time for relaxation, it has become a time for additional demands for our time. There just seem to be so many things to do between now and Christmas. Maybe it's because, whether for parties or because of end of year projects at work, it feels like everyone wants a piece of our time. Also, as we have ended daylight savings time, the days seem shorter; so, it seems like time is running out more

guickly each day.

A couple of weeks ago our lectionary text was about time. I know that some of you might have been "ticked off" with the ticking clock in the background that was used to make a point during the sermon. Time is ticking away, and as much as we would like to put "time in a bottle" as the old Jim Croce song dreamed of, we can't do it. In my readings this week, I encountered some interesting takes on time. One article pointed out that "time" is an elusive concept. Time is not always measured by the clock. For example: Sometimes time is measured in the ability to concentrate. Haven't we all, at sometime, told someone, "I don't have time to think about this now?" That usually doesn't mean that we can't find five minutes on the clock to think about a new question; it just means that you know that you already have so many things to think about that you won't be able to focus adequately on the

question at hand.

Sometimes time is measured in emotional stamina. Have you ever said, "I don't have time to deal with this?" Your clock might have the hours required, but you are too drained from everything else.

Sometimes time is measured in physical stamina. You have clock time left, but you have become physically tired and you know it is time to stop.

In this Season of Advent, many of our lectionary scriptures are about time. The meaning of "time" in the Bible is sometimes complicated for us to understand because in New Testament Greek there are, in fact, two words for "time." The first is "chronos" from which we get the English word "chronology." It refers to clock time, calendar time, and what we normally think of as time.

However the other New Testament Greek word for time is "chairos." This isn't about clocks or calendars. It's asking whether it is the right time to do something or for something to happen. Perhaps you husbands can identify when your pregnant wife awakened you at 3 a.m. and said "It's time!" That statement had nothing to do with the clock, but about getting to the hospital as quickly as possible.

It is this kind of time that our scripture talks about throughout the days of Advent. It is about the fulfillment of the promises of the Old Testament of the arrival of the Messiah.

We need to be sure that during this Season of Advent we don't get too worn out checking off the days, shopping, partying, and running ourselves so ragged that we don't take time to remember, as they say "the reason for the season." But in fact, every time and every season is an opportunity for us to see and experience God's presence in our lives and the world around us. And in every time and every season are moments in which God is calling us to be part of what He's doing in the world.

And so in the Season of Advent, lesus calls us to struggle against the things that weigh us down, by looking for what God is doing in this and every season. In this Season of Advent, lesus promises us again that God's "chairos" time is always right now-and that God is inviting each and every one of us to live more fully into the time God is giving us right now.

We have a special service planned for the first Sunday of Advent titled "Advent Lessons and Carols". Associate Pastor Josh developed the service based on text composed by the Rev. Dr. Lisa W. Davison, Johnnie Eargle Cadieux Professor of Hebrew Bible at Phillips Theological Seminary. If you are able, find the time to be in worship this Sunday, and invite a friend.

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## **Report on Annual Congregational Meeting**

The vote on officers passed with forty-three ballots cast with all but one ballot approving all nominees. The ballot on amendments had forty-one ballots cast with thirty-seven approving all proposed amendments. Four ballots approved all but one or two amendments.

With the approval of the constitution and by-laws, there will be two more elders appointed for approval by the board at its next meeting.
