Dear FCC Family and Friends,

About 25 years ago, the late Judge Glenn Dale Carter, a long time member of our church had a dream of creating a safe, non-threatening place for abused children to be examined, interviewed, and helped without being taken to the cold, and perhaps frightening, atmospheres of the police station and court-house



He was able to see part of his dream fulfilled when the Unzner family donated their home, providing a place for that to happen. Thus was born the Unzner House, which our church has supported over the years with contributions from our Pumpkin Patch, Christmas Offering, and Ground Hog Dinners. It is my understanding that state funding for Unzner House operations was significantly cut a few years ago, and there was a period during which the facility was closed.

District Attorney Richard Smothermon has worked to reopen the Unzner House. However, there are many issues that exist that cause the situation to fall short of the dream that Judge Carter had so many years ago.

Today, Smothermon has revived the dream and is working to greatly expand upon the concept of providing a one-stop facility that will better suit the needs of the abused, separate from police stations and the courthouses of Pottawatomie and Lincoln Counties.

He and members of his staff have been working on implementing a program that has been successful in San Diego, California. In June, a two-day seminar and workshop provided by the Alliance for Hope was held for members of our community. Approximately, fifty people attended, including community leaders, law enforcement officers, and representatives from: Smothermon's staff, Project Safe, Youth and Family Resources, and our local Native American tribes. The consensus of that meeting was that it is time to move forward with the Family Justice Center concept.

By the end of the seminar/workshop, more than \$300,000 in commitments to help launch the project were pledged, enabling the hiring of a project director and paying for temporary accommodations. One Safe Place is the name that has been chosen for the project, and First Christian Church will be providing the "incubator" location for this important ministry in Shawnee.

Today, I believe Judge Carter is smiling from above, as his church, our church, is actively working to see his dream come true, as we have initially made four rooms on the second floor of the education wing available to help launch this project. As it grows and expands, we have also reserved additional space on the first floor of the education wing to accommodate initial future needs. The puppets which were purchased years ago and have been locked in a cabinet for a decade or more will also be used by the forensic interviewer to help children relate their stories.

We expect One Safe Place to be using our facilities for at least two years, perhaps three, as the group works toward raising \$7.5 million to construct a permanent facility which will also include shelter for victims. At this point, it is anticipated that all of the services except shelter will be provided with one stop here at our church.

This move will likely take many of our long time members back to the time when First Christian Church helped launch Project Safe. One of the first, if not the first, grief support groups in our community was also begun here. We have also made our kitchen and Fellowship Hall available to various civic groups for fund raisers, dance lessons, and choir rehearsals.

The upcoming $\frac{1}{2}$ cent county sales tax election for our schools next Tuesday also includes .005 cents for the Family Justice Center.

Had it not been for the work of many dedicated individuals through their financial support and physical labor over the years to maintain our facilities, we would not be in a position to help on this important ministry for our community. We owe a real debt of gratitude to those who help build and maintain this facility over the years.

When you are in the church during the week and you see people from the One Safe Place staff, don't treat them as outsiders, but get to know them. Thank them for what they are doing to help the children and others who are victims of abuse.

Josh will be preaching this coming Sunday. If you are able, be in worship Sunday and continue to support and encourage him as he continues on his path of ministry.
