Santa was booked up, so he will **not** appear. However, there will be candy sacks for the children.








Dear FCC Family and Friends,

I doubt if any of you are really concerned, but the World Wrestling Entertainment (WWE) is in trouble. In an article I read this week the author ponders whether the church can learn anything from the WWE.





I believe I have seen some worship services that seemed to be more an exhibition than real, but that's not the point the individual writing the article wanted to make. Nor do I.

My information comes from the author; I'll admit I'm not a fan of WWE. He says the reason the WWE is in trouble is they have invested too heavily in their old celebrities. Most of their stars are over-the-hill and are having some difficulty staying in shape. You may not recognize the names, but the Undertaker is 50 years old and Kane is 48. Sting is now 56. The WWE still tries to build their pay-per-view programs by trotting out other old timers like the Rock, Stone Cold Steve Austin, Ric Flair, and others.

They have gotten to the point there is no real talent, ratings-drawing, or bankable name to rely on because the WWE didn't develop their young talent.

The author of the article says, "It reminded me of many of our churches." He goes on to say, "Okay, it reminded me of my church."

I am reminded of an extremely bright, committed young man who grew up in our church. I remember one thing he told me about why he was leaving. He said, "People never let me grow up. They still treat me as if I'm just a kid and too young to do anything."

Like many churches we are a little like the WWE: still relying on our aging folks to get things done. One of the things that I like about our recent changes in our Constitution and By-Laws is that we dropped the term Junior Deacon. Another change that I like is what Josh started doing when he was preaching, that we now continue to do each Sunday: involving the youth in our worship service.

I was also pleased to see that we added one younger person as a new elder for 2016.

One of the real blessings that Josh has brought to our youth is educating them on the church and the reason we do some of the things that we do. This is in addition to teaching them about Jesus Christ and the scriptures. I dare say that our youth know more about the lectionary, the reason for the changes in the seasonal colors during the lectionary year, communion, and the history of the Disciples of Christ, than many of the rest of our congregation.

Steve Scott has pointed out on several occasions how we need to be training younger people in the church to take the place of our more "mature" members to make sure we have the leadership we need for the future.

We have been fortunate to have some real stars—solid Christians—who have served on many committees and will do anything for the sake of the church. Too often we have taken them for granted, thinking they will always be around to serve. But things happen. People get sick. People die. People move. People get tired and need a break every once in a while.

The author of the article said that he has not come up with a list of "Five Things to Get Your People Involved", because he's still trying to figure out things for his church. He says, "But what we do need to do is start intentionally and actively recruiting, educating, training, and equipping our people to serve and lead."

If you look around at those in our worship service these days you will see more younger faces than we've had in several years. We all need to get to know them. We need to learn their names. We need to let them know that they have a place here, including places of leadership.

We are about to begin our 125th year of providing ministry in Shawnee and the surrounding community. We have a responsibility to reach and train those who will lead the church into the future.

This coming Sunday the Chancel Choir will present the cantata, *The Nativity*, and Pastor Josh will be providing the meditation. We will have our annual tasting party following worship.


