Dear FCC Family and Friends,

As most of you know, this year will be our 125th Anniversary year as the oldest church in Shawnee. When I look back over the historical records, I am reminded what the church truly is—it is the people.

If you ask some people what the church is, you might find some who immediately think about a building. Some might think that a church is nothing more than a place to go when it is a time to get married or buried. Others might see it as a place to have their children baptized.

One pastor writes, "I suppose that it is all those things and, to a degree to which these things get people to think about the grace and mercy of God and the abundant life as promised to us by Jesus, it is not a fundamentally wrong way to look at the church, though it is far from being adequate."

However, he goes on to write, "Seeing the church as primarily a dealer of spiritual goods and services for people to come and consume is really not very helpful, though it is incredibly common in our world today."

The ministries of the church are understood by some to be a kind of spiritual marketplace, where they can pick and choose what they think will be relevant to them; and, if nothing seems overwhelmingly appealing, then they just walk on by and go about their business.

As I look through historical documents of our church, it becomes very apparent to me that for the many years we have been around, the majority of those who have called First Christian Church their church have understood that each of us is the church.

I also believe it should become obvious that it is the people, lay and clergy, led by the Holy Spirit to use their spiritual gifts that have brought us to this point in time.

The church was never intended to be a building, or a resting place, or a social club, but a group of people doing their best to follow in the footsteps of lesus.

The Apostle Paul writes in 1 Corinthians 12, For just as the body is one and has many members, and all the members of the body, though many, are one body, so it is with Christ. For in the one Spirit we were all baptized into one body.... I Corinthians 12:12-13a NRSV

Paul is saying that God has not allowed us to exempt ourselves from the body of Christ. It does not matter who you are, what your gifts are, or what you do in the church, you are fully a part of the Body of Christ.

The scripture also tells us that if a church ever becomes made up of the same kinds of people, people who all value the same things and think the same things, it is something very much **other** than the church was meant to be.

The church is meant to be made up of all kinds of people, people who have different backgrounds, who have different gifts, who can do things that other people cannot do, or perhaps don't want to do.

One of the things that I believe has made this church strong through the years is that we have had no set of rules, no "book of discipline." I like one of the early day sayings of our denomination "No creed, but Christ."

Under "What Disciples Believe" you will find this: Disciples are called together around one essential of faith: belief in Jesus Christ as Lord and Savior. Persons are free to follow their consciences guided by the Bible, the Holy Spirit, study and prayer and are expected to extend that freedom to others. This means that we are to tolerate—even love one another. When people ask me about our church I often say, "We have people who are politically and theologically extremely liberal to politically and theologically extremely conservative, and we try our best to get along."

It is when we of so many differences come together as one body, that we truly become the church—the Body of Christ in the world. I can remember many times in our past when there were disagreements over what direction our church should take regarding a ministry or project, but once a decision was made, those who were on the other side of the question would be first in line to support the decision of the majority. That is being the Body of Christ. It is part of our 125 year history as First Christian Church, and I pray that it will also be part of our future.

The sermon title for Sunday is "One Body" and is based on I Corinthians 12:12-31a. If you are able, be part of this One Body in worship on Sunday.



Leadership Training

"Mission Possible" is the theme for this year's Regional Church's Annual Leadership Training School which will be held on Saturday, February 6, at Restoration Church (Formerly First Christian Church) of Oklahoma City.


Tickets will be going on sale soon, and everyone is encouraged to help with ticket sales.
